

1. PROMOTE DIALOGUE ON SECURITY CONDITIONS

We strongly call upon the establishment of a common ground and a shared vision between the different regions of Libya. This vision will only be possible when all social and political groups engage in discussion and problem solving that aims to improve the security conditions of the country. The security of Libya's borders, both land and maritime borders, should be a concern for all Libyans. High levels of violence, associated today with the flows of human trafficking, oil, arms, and drug smuggling are an impediment to building trust among the people. Security conditions in the whole country, acknowledging the specific problems in the South, West and East, must be openly discussed and made visible in order to advance a shared vision for Libya's future.

2. ACTIVATE THE LEGAL FRAMEWORK FOR THE TRANSITION

We urge the amendment of the political agreement once again, and the amendment of laws to achieve a civil state. We urge to give priority to national stability – unifying the state institutions and the activation of the constitution. The current crisis should not be used to weaken laws on women, but to revisit and reinforce laws to guarantee women's rights and duties. Especially the political representation of women in the leadership positions as stipulated in the 1325 resolution and reinforced by a national action plan should be a priority. We urge greater commitment to the implementation of the resolutions taken by the Security Council regarding the Libyan crisis, and request transparency in the follow-up of the outcomes of the Berlin Conference.

3. CREATE SOCIAL SOLIDARITY AND SHARED RESPONSIBILITY

We also call for a greater solidarity among all Libyans and urge to establish the principle of accepting others and raising awareness on reconciliation through dialogue. There is a necessity to review our social lifestyle and increase the sense of solidarity among the wealthy Libyans towards those who are suffering because of the war. Given the special conditions the country is going through, attention should be drawn to the conditions of Libyans displaced by the war and to widows and orphans. The time in finding a common ground to build a strong social solidarity is now. This solidarity and dialogue must materialize between the different regions, diverse political views, men and women, as well as tribes.

4. GIVE STRONG SUPPORT TO WOMEN'S PARTICIPATION

We demand national authorities and international actors to protect women in decision making positions and place attention to the security conditions of civil society activists. Women's involvement in the political parties should be supported and their participation in the political process secured. Women should be involved in developing budgets of the economic projects and supported as mediators between grassroots and decision-makers. Libya should follow the example of countries where mothers have met with the warlords to campaign about ending war, truth and reconciliation. To advance the previous issues, we strongly request the establishment of a women's advisory committee to the United Nations Mission in Libya in the model of the Yemeni Commission as suggested by Ms. Mogherini during the meeting of women mediators in Brussels.
