High-Level Dialogue on

“Where is Peace in the New European Security Architecture?”



## Concept Note

Since the start of the Russian aggression against Ukraine, much has been said and written about how the ongoing war is exposing serious weaknesses in the European security architecture, as well as in the international peace architecture. The concerns are often defined as existentialist, whilst also declaring that having a commonly defined threat is generating unprecedented unity, which is blowing life into both EU enlargement and the EU’s global partnership agenda.

At the centre of the debate is the need to bridge divides and confirm allies, pertaining to complex questions about types of cooperation and collaborations, dependencies versus autonomy, and solidarity versus a strategic vision. With imminent security threats at the EU’s doorstep, security and defence is receiving a lot of attention both in terms of actual investment and debate about a new European security order. Less focus is put on the fundamental shifts that all of this brings for the core identity and fundamental values of the European Union as the world’s largest peace project, when it is no longer about bringing the members together to ensure their peaceful relations but to join members together against external aggression.

With this high-level dialogue, we suggest to explore these questions by unpacking the role of peace in the new European security architecture, looking first closer to home at EU enlargement and subsequently further afar on the EU as a global peace actor. What role does EU enlargement play in the new European security architecture, in particular with regard to peace and the EU as a peace project, both at home and abroad? What should EU leaders and policymakers take into account as the new European security architecture is being set out, if the EU and its Member States intend to remain a power for (positive) peace, stability and prosperity in Europe and the world? What does the new European security architecture mean for the role that the EU want and can play as a global peace actor?

## **1. Panel on EU enlargement and peacemaking in the new European security architecture**

When the war in Ukraine ends, it will need to be underpinned by a new European security architecture that guarantee and address the security concerns of the EU and European states without undermining peace, at home and abroad. This panel will focus on EU enlargement and peacemaking in the new European security architecture. As the EU embarks on a new enlargement phase, with an ‘associated trio’ (Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia), how can the EU make sure to fully utilise enlargement as an asset for ensuring its geopolitical role in favour of peace, across all accession countries while maintaining the integrity of the accession process through a merit-based approach? And where do the European regional partnerships and developments in NATO and the OSCE fit into this, as well as mini-lateral formations in the EU’s neighbourhood?

## **2. Panel on the EU as a global (peace) actor in the new European security architecture**

The recent EU defence developments and ongoing reconfiguration of the European security architecture are having an impact on the EU’s foreign policy and external action. What the EU is and is not doing is changing, as is the perception of the EU around the globe and thus what the EU can and cannot do. This panel will ask questions about how the developments at home, affect the EU abroad, and where (positive) peace fits into all this. How can the EU make sure

that the new European security architecture, underpinned by more pronounced security and defence priorities and capabilities, does not risk to undermine longstanding EU foreign policy priorities and strengths from international cooperation and trade, to humanitarian aid, crisis response, the Integrated Approach, and support to sustainable development and the promotion and upholding of human rights? How to ensure that the strengthening of the EU's hard power, reinforces rather than challenges the EU as a global (positive) peace actor?
